

My Saviour Knew

Every year in the lead up to Good Friday, I see posts on social media mocking Jesus. Many times I've come across cartoon drawings or jokes, portraying Jesus as some sort of unknowing simpleton who has no idea what's about to happen to Him in regards to the Crucifixion.

The Crucifixion of Jesus Christ however, was carefully thought out and planned by God, millenniums before mankind ever existed. Christ's death was part of God's plan for man from the very beginning as He knew we would need saving from the consequences of our own sin. As we're told in Acts 2:23,

"This man was handed over to you by God's deliberate plan and foreknowledge; and you, with the help of wicked men, put Him to death by nailing Him to the cross."

There are many Scriptures which show us that Jesus Himself predicted His own death and identified His betrayer Judas, long before Crucifixion Day. To paint Jesus, the Creator of the Universe as oblivious and unaware is, ironically, a very foolish and uninformed thing to do.

While I respect the God-given free-will everyone has to choose whether or not to acknowledge Jesus Christ as Saviour, I do find it heartbreaking to see the Man who died on our behalf, ridiculed by the very people He died for.

I find it equally upsetting to see the most powerful moment in history reduced to nothing more than a point of mockery. The moment when God **Himself** made it possible for mankind to be united once more with their Creator. It could be said that this position of disregard is perhaps a sad reflection, and mere echo of the scornful insults, spat at Jesus on Crucifixion Day.

While I didn't ever outrightly mock the Crucifixion of Jesus, I know there were times in my youth when I didn't grasp the power, magnitude or beauty of Christ's sacrifice. I'm grateful that followers of Jesus still shared His love with me and I know I'm included in the words of Romans 5:6-8 which read,

"You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly. Very rarely will anyone die for a righteous person, though for a good person someone might possibly dare to die. But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

It's for this reason that I wrote my poem, "My Saviour Knew," with the intention of appealing to the heart of the non-believer. The tone isn't intended to be aggressive or angry. Rather, my prayer for this poem is that it may inspire the one who mocks Jesus to just take a moment, step back and reconsider their position.

Whether or not they choose to look deeper into what Jesus actually achieved through His planned Crucifixion is up to them but may we never be in any doubt as to the intelligence of Christ, His commitment to saving His creation and His heart of love for the lost souls of mankind.

I hear your words of mockery and scornful ridicule, Perhaps you think it's humorous to paint Christ as a fool. I don't know if your disregard comes from a place of hate But either way, I'd like to share some things to contemplate.

The Maker of the Universe is not naive or slow. You speak of His betrayal as if He didn't know. Every year at Easter I hear this foolish view. Before you say another word, please know, my Saviour knew.

Jesus *knew* His purpose, He knew why He had come. He came not to condemn the world but *save* it as God's Son! Jesus wasn't ignorant, He *knew* He'd be betrayed And yet His love for me and you is *why* my Saviour stayed!
